## **Conference Description**

This conference has been designed for physicians and health care professionals that are involved in the management of renal failure patients, critically ill patients and patients with congestive heart failure. The conference addresses the needs of nephrologists, critical care specialists, hospitalists and cardiologists with an interest in blood purification, dialysis, blood filtration, kidney failure and disorders involving heart and kidney dysfunction.

The ISBP 2010 meeting gathers a superb faculty to present the latest and most pertinent issues in understanding and managing renal disease in the chronic setting and in the critically ill patient.

Highlights include the state-of-the-art in emerging strategies for the management of ESRD patients, such as home and daily dialysis, cardiovascular disease and endothelial dysfunction with specific attention to factors that have been shown to play a role in the unacceptably high mortality of ESRD patients. The conference will also address phosphate toxicity, the impact of blocking PTH receptors and anemia and their pertinence to improving patient outcomes. The conference places special emphasis on controversial problems in critical care nephrology, such as the use of renal replacement convective therapies, the pros and cons of convective versus diffusive modalities and a debate on the controversial issue of dialysis dose in acute kidney injury.

Topics of interest also include the growing problem of the morbidity and mortality of congestive heart failure and the role of cardiorenal syndrome. Particular attention will also be dedicated to practical problems in peritoneal dialysis, catheter technology and catheter related infection.

## **Objectives**

**At the completion of this conference, participants should be better able to:**

- Understand the evolving field of home and wearable dialysis devices
- Improve the management of congestive heart failure and understand the implications of the cardiorenal syndrome and the different approaches to its treatment
- Understand the latest developments in CKD and its role on cardiac mortality. Address the mechanisms of cardiovascular mortality in dialysis patients
- Address the multiple factors contributing to the unacceptably high mortality and the mechanisms that cause most deaths in ESRD patients
- Assess and treat patients in critical care nephrology and gain an understanding of renal replacement therapies in acute kidney injury

### Abstracts

The International Society of Blood Purification welcomes abstract submissions on the following Topics and Issues:

1. Development, improvement and dosing of extracorporeal and peritoneal treatment modalities of acute and terminal renal failure.
2. Monitoring and control systems of extracorporeal therapies of renal failure. Vascular access for hemodialysis.
3. Evaluation and comparative interpretation of longterm results of renal replacement therapies.
4. Economical issues of renal replacement therapy.
5. Pathogenesis and prevention of detrimental biological processes in the patient induced by renal replacement therapy.
6. Pathogenesis and prevention of longterm complications of survival on regular renal replacement therapy such as:
  - Cardiovascular disease
  - Hypertension
  - Anemia
  - Beta2M-amyloidosis
  - Infections
  - Renal osteodystrophy
  - Malnutrition
7. New and future technologies and principles of blood purification and organ replacement (including indications outside nephrology).

Submitted abstracts will be graded and assigned to oral or poster presentation.

All abstracts will be published in the *Blood Purification Journal*.

The trustees of the ISBP have funded 6 prizes of \$1000 to best 6 abstracts.
